Walt Disney

Walt Disney was born on December 5, 1901 in Chicago Illinois. Walt was one of five children, four boys and a girl. (0) **A** . Walt had very early interests in art and he would often sell drawings to neighbours to make extra money. He pursued his art career by studying art and photography in McKinley High School in Chicago. (49) . However, Walt was encouraged by his mother, and older brother, Roy to follow his talent.

In 1918, Disney attempted to enlist for military service. (50) . Instead, Walt joined the Red Cross and was sent overseas to France, where he spent a year driving an ambulance and chauffeuring Red Cross officials. His ambulance was covered with Disney cartoons.

(51) . He started a small company called Laugh-O-Grams, which eventually fell bankrupt. With his suitcase, and twenty dollars, Walt headed to Hollywood to start anew.

Soon Walt became a recognized Hollywood figure. On July 13, 1925, Walt married one of his first employees, Lillian Bounds, in Lewiston, Idaho. (52) . At home, Walt was loving and understanding. He gave love by being interested, involved and always there for his family and friends.

Three years after Walt and Lilly got married, Walt created a new animated character, Mickey Mouse. Walt soon started making full-colour cartoons. In 1932, the production entitled Flowers and Trees won Walt the first of his studio's Academy Awards. On December 21, 1937, Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs, the first full-length animated musical feature, premiered in Los Angeles. (53) . The film is still considered one of the greatest monuments of the motion picture industry. During the next five years, Walt Disney Studios completed other full-length animated classics such as Pinocchio, Fantasia, Dumbo and Bambi.

Walt Disney's dream of a clean and organized amusement park came true as Disneyland Park opened in 1955. (54) . By the beginning of its second quarter-century the venue had entertained more than 200 million people, including presidents, kings and queens from all over the globe.

Walt Disney is a legend. (55) . His worldwide popularity was based upon the ideals which his name represents: imagination, optimism, creation and self-made success. Through his work he brought joy, happiness and a universal means of communication to the people of every nation.

Top 5 extreme sports

- A Surfing** is a challenging sport to learn. It is the ancient sport of Hawaiian kings, now widely practised across the world in almost every country with a coastline. It is physically demanding, often frustrating, and you need to be able to continue training for a long time without losing interest. You need to be strong, flexible and have excellent endurance. The fitter you are, the longer you will be able to surf for. Surfing can be exhilarating or relaxing, fast or slow, wild or controlled, competitive or soulful... whatever you want really, because how you ride your surfboard is up to you.
- B Bungee jumping.** We have all imagined the scenario: you are standing on the platform with nothing but a length of rope tied to your feet. Your loved ones or friends are all watching you from the sidelines, showing you two thumbs up. The guide leads you to the edge and you suddenly realise how far down the ground is. Then the countdown begins and you are pushed over the threshold. It is a perfect way to face your fears and confront them. It will be something you talk about for the rest of your life.
- C White water rafting** is basically a water rodeo with rubber boats and life jackets. It is great fun and easy to get into. One of the fantastic things about a white water rafting holiday is that you are not going to struggle to find a scenic place to ride a few decent rapids – some of the best rafting destinations also happen to be incredibly beautiful. Yet, you should always keep in mind that for safety purposes rafting should never be done solo or in the dark.
- D Rock climbing** is meant for you if you are not afraid of heights and want to get toned arms and legs. The challenge, the triumph and the pure satisfaction of reaching the top is simply indescribable. The dangers associated with rock climbing can be lessened or prevented entirely if you know how to do it and if you are able to give basic first aid. It is also advisable to familiarise yourself with the basic terms and techniques used in rock climbing before you head towards the cliffs.
- E Skateboarding** is considered an extreme sport although skateboarders often see it as a form of art, hobby or just a means of transport. It is a relatively modern sport, appearing in the 1950ies in California when it was known as Sidewalk Surfing. Now it is often called street surfing. The tricks and jumps that skateboarders do can result in a serious injury if not executed perfectly. A danger of serious injuries classifies skateboarding as an extreme sport.

Teenager sails solo around the world

In 2012, Dutch teenager Laura Dekker became the youngest sailor to sail alone around the world. She had to cope with loneliness, ocean storms and a fear of pirates while sailing a small yacht, at the same time trying to keep up with her studies. But she will not be sailing into the record books. After the controversy she caused when she announced she was going to try to break the record in a small boat aged just 13, Guinness World Records decided to stop recognising records for “youngest” sailors.

Laura escaped abroad in 2010 when Dutch child welfare tried to stop her making the voyage. She later won a 10-month court battle, promising judges she would buy a bigger boat, take courses in first aid and coping with lack of sleep, and register in a special online school. Unlike other young round-the-world sailors, she made several stops at ports to check the condition of her boat and to brush up on her studies.

Dekker made stops in numerous coastal sites during her trip, in places such as the Galapagos Islands, Bora Bora and Cape Town, South Africa. According to multiple published reports, she had once planned to return to Gibraltar by going through the Suez Canal, but altered her route and headed around South Africa toward Sint Maarten to avoid pirates.

During her trip, she went surfing, cliff diving and discovered a new hobby: playing the flute, which was easier to play than a guitar in bad weather. Laura complained about ripped sails, a wet and salty bed, a near-collision with two cargo ships and the presence of some nasty travel companions: cockroaches.

Laura grew up on boats with her sailor father. She has a New Zealand passport as she was born in New Zealand waters – on a boat – during a seven-year voyage made by her parents. At the age of 12 she sailed solo from the Netherlands to Britain. Her latest voyage has divided the Netherlands where her father has been called irresponsible and accused of looking for attention from the media.

Laura has written a book on her two-year fight with Dutch officials. She said that she was so tired of the debate it had aroused in Holland that she might move abroad.
