- ask the candidate to sign the attendance form
- collect the candidate's notes]

STAGE 2: Task 1 (max 5–6 minutes)

[Allow 1 minute of uninterrupted preparation time. The recorder must NOT be switched off for that time.]

- 2. How common is it among your friends to travel to exotic places? (Why?)
- 3. Will people travel more or less in the future? (Explain.)
- 4. What would you like to ask the people in the pictures?
